MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Dick Adamowicz is the focus of this member spotlight. Dick retired from Toledo Hydromantic in 1988. He spent most of his time on the third shift, and said he enjoyed it. We had a few conversations over this past year. In our conversations we talked about unionism and what it means. Dick said, "if it wasn't for a union, it would be hell." He was hired at Martin Perry on December 3rd, 1956 and retired from GM in 1988.

On one of his visits, he shared with me his collection of dues pins. Dues pins are what the union gave out to members when they paid union dues. Dick had a collection of pins going all the way back to 1937. The early pins would have one month on them along with the year, in the mid-forties it changed to two months per button. The most recent pin I could find for the UAW is 1997. In 1935 the Wagner Act made it easier for unions to negotiate dues check offs in their contracts. This is



something we had at Local 14. The UAW and Local 14 both came into existence in 1935. In 1947, the Taft Hartley Act was passed which made it easier in Right to Work States for people not to be in unions even though their workplace was organized. Dick said he always wore his pin because he was proud to say he was a union person!



Dick talked about a wildcat strike in the 60's that didn't last too long. He laughed when he said management would take pictures of them. He also talked about what a great union town Toledo is. His uncle was the head of the sign painter's union, and his best friend was the head of the retailer's union. When asked if he still thinks we need unions today he said yes! He said Starbucks just went on strike recently and we need more of that.

In a separate visit he showed me his first three check stubs. I was in awe of how much fewer taxes they paid in the 50's! I really enjoy conversations with our retirees. They are a wealth of knowledge and experience along with being funny. Thank you, Dick, for sharing your story with our membership and the pins!



PRESIDENTS REPORT BY TONY TOTTY

I hope this report finds you and your family well. As we start the new year, we need to look at the challenges that face us ahead. This year we will have a transformation to our facility that we set us up for the future. This will come with a short-term disruption to our membership, but this is the quickest turnaround we've ever had with a product line. 2023 is also a contract year. Expectations are high and rightfully so. We are fortunate to send Jeff King, our Chairman, to the national bargaining table. We



ining table. We know he will do a great job and represent us well. It was only four short years ago many of us experienced a strike. While it is rare that

the same company is selected two contracts in a row to be the strike target, we should prepare as though it could be us again. Please save as much as you can, including profit sharing for those that receive it. Also, please look at the Money Matters booklet available on the Local 14 website.

When we think back to our strike in 2019, we experienced support from other "big 3" Locals. They supported us because they knew we were on the line fighting for them as well. If Ford or Stellantis goes on strike, we should be there for them the same way they were there for us. Article 41 Section 2 of our UAW Constitution states: it shall be the duty of each member to render aid and assistance to Brother or Sister members in cases of illness, death or distress, and acquit her/himself as a loyal and devoted member of the International Union. Local 14 will uphold this duty!

Historically new contracts also produce new retirees. This contract looks to be no different. We look to see many active members chose the path of Ray Fisher. Ray was the Local 14 member that was the first automotive 30 and out retiree in the nation. We have some great history at Local 14! With these retirements bring new opportunities. While it seems impossible to replace some of our strongest active members, we must find more voices and leaders now. The best way to do this is to encourage members to join standing committees! I'm also working with local 12 to start a Young Workers Council. We are working on the details now and will have our first meeting shortly. Please participate we need you!

CHAIRMANS REPORT BY JEFF KING

Brothers and Sisters,

I hope everyone had a wonderful Holiday break. As we look forward to 2023, I wanted to take

a look back at some of the highlights that happened in 2022.

In January, The Shop Committee and I went to management and told them that the overtime in 6-speed had become ridiculous. Their decision to take second shift off impacted our membership on both shifts. After exten-

sive meetings with them, we were able to get them to admit this and they agreed to add the shift back on. This, in turn, allowed the plant to take in more transfers, bring back all temporary employees who wanted to return, and convert some of them.

While this lengthy process to bring transfers and our temporary employees back played out, the membership on second shift was asked to go work on other products to help reduce some of the overtime those products faced. Management came up with a nickname for the farm out and called it a "Jump Crew". Upper management outside of this facility, on many occasions, recognized the hard work and flexibility of our membership. While it is always nice to hear them recognize how fantastic our members are, it's really a tribute to you and how hard our members work to make the best transmissions in the world.

As we worked through this issue, bargaining began to bring in new work to our plant. The process to secure this for our membership took over five months. As you know, bargaining usually starts with management starting with their lowest offer and we work from there. I will say that the Shop Committee and I were very happy to secure a long-term future for our membership with very little given up. As I mentioned in the all-employee meetings, had we have not bargained for this new work, over five hundred members could have been permanently displaced from this plant but because of this new work we retained the 500 jobs and, in the future, we could be adding up to 300 more jobs.

And since I am on the topic of all employee meetings, after years of not having them, management finally had all employee meetings for all shifts and products. I want to commend all of you as I was very proud to be the Chairman of this Local because of how well you all approached these meetings. You asked inciteful questions and showed management, once again, how much you care about the work you do.

The next scheduled holiday is Martin Luthor King Day on January 16, 2023. The Civil and Human Rights Committee will be holding their 14th Annual Celebration & Conversation Dinner to honor Dr. King on January 28. The keynote Speaker is Walter Naegle, the executive director of the Bayard

Rustin Fund, an organization that commemorates the life and pioneering work Mr. Rustin did during the Civil Rights Movement. I want to commend the work that Starlisa Belcher and Brian VanPelt did to have Mr. Naegle Join us. If you are interested in attending, please contact Starlisa, Brian, or the Local 14 Office for ticket information.

I would like to take the time to remind everyone of the proper process when trying to get an issue handled in the plant. If you have an issue you should always place a Committee, call to talk to your district representative. Don't call the Chairman or President first. Many times, people are calling Tony or myself and when we go to speak to the district representative, they are unaware of any issue. Always speak to them first in order to get your issue resolved as quickly as possible.

Finally, I hope everyone has a safe and prosperous year in 2023. There will be many challenges to come but I know with the great membership, here at Local 14, we can get through them all.

Toledo Propulsion Systems would not be here today without your hard work.



Financial Secretary Sue Rodgers

RBC Bank account balance on 12/31/2022, was \$2,739,933.39. The book value on 12/31/2022, was \$2,705,515.39. The actual value was \$34,418.00, higher than we can report on the Financial Statement. This is our unrealized gain, and if we cashed in our investments on 12/31/22, our payout would have been \$2,739,933.39.

The International Union recently posted the Strike and Defense funds for the month of October. The Net Worth ending September 30, 2022, was \$841,472,462.46. The income for October was \$5,425,705.94, and the disbursements were \$6,089,808.54. This left an ending Net Worth of \$840,808,359.86, and we had six active UAW Strikes.



SKILLED TRADES ADVISORY **COUNCIL MEETING**

Well, hello again union Brothers and Sisters. Again, it's no surprise that the first topic of discussion at the fall Advisory Council in Sandusky was the need for Skilled Trades. Our quest was Becky Irvin who replaced Bill Peterson from the office of



the Presidents Skilled Trades Department. One of her main focuses is working with the apprenticeship programs. She noted that any facility needing help with setting up or other apprenticeship issues should have their Servicing Rep contact her at the Skilled Trades Department. She also stated that due to the shortage and wages of outside contractors the UAW should be in a good position to get more money for the Skilled Trades. Let's hope so. She mentioned the Government has been giving out grant money for apprenticeships for the states to hand out. Check with your state leaders to see what grants could be available.

With the EV's coming, pressure will be on Local unions to pursue this type of work. It not only affects GM, but all the parts suppliers, which there are a lot of, to do the same. We're fortunate here in Toledo to land some of the EV work. Good job everybody.

There was an article in "Seek Ohio" written by Paul Vernon an AP writer, that had some interesting facts on the Intel chip plant going up west of Columbus, OH. They will be looking for some 7000 construction workers. Some of council members near Columbus stated the need for some 2500 Electricians with wages starting around \$85/hr., plus overtime benefits. Hard to pass up if your especially in a Local around the Columbus area. Article stated that several other big projects are scheduled around that area also. Intel alone will create a huge void in trades. Families with children and or grandchildren in high school that are undecided about what direction to go should surely consider the electrical or robotic field for sure.

Thank you to the membership for sending me to this important conference.




