PRESIDENTS REPORT BY TONY TOTTY

I hope this report finds you and your family well. As the year quickly comes to an end, I want to thank the membership for another great year. As we approach the holiday season, I will thank you

in advance for your generosity for giving to the Toy's for Tots, Toledo News Boys, and the Angel Tree, and the food and



toy drive at the retiree's dinner. We are very fortunate to be in the position we are, and this could not be done without our union. We also know the holiday season isn't filled with cheer for everyone. Please check on your friends and family to make sure they are okay.

Recently, U.S. Senator Sherrod Brown held a press conference at Local 14. He was here to talk about keeping Chinese made vehicles out of our country. He cited a security risk due to data concerns and wants to prevent them from entering in through Mexico using the USMC trade agreement to do it. We support those that support us. This support follows the long list of actions that Senator has taken on our behalf. The CHIPS act helped bring back semiconductor manufacturing to this country. This will help shore up our supply chain and reduce the layoffs we experienced recently. The Inflation Reduction Act encouraged battery facility production in this country and with our new agreement, it allowed our members from Lordstown to return home. The Pact Act helped Veterans that were around burn pits in war zones. The Butch Lewis act helped restore multi-employer pensions to their full amount for retirees. These are just some of the actions Sherrod was most recently associated with. This is in addition to walking our strike lines and always



making his staff available to us for any issues our member's encounter. This is the most expensive senate race in U.S. history and the reason is, they want Sherrod out of office because he represents the working-class people too well. Please consider Sherrod Brown for Senate but vote no matter who your candidate is.

Lastly, next year on October 1st we will celebrate our 90th anniversary as a Local. Our Local has spanned the time during many important labor events. Our founders supported the Auto Lite workers in 1934. We were the first Local to strike Chevrolet in 1935. Our first President Bob Travis ran the Flint Sit Down Strike. The AP Parts strike made national news during its time. We supported countless strikes by other unions and banded together when our number was called to go out for ourselves. Our community is better because we are a part of it. Through these labor actions we negotiated better wages, benefits, and jobs security. This allows us to have our dignity in the workplace and in retirement. Thank you to every single UAW Local 14 Member for your contribution to this great union! We do not know what the future holds, but when we come together as Local 14 Members we will win.

CHAIRMANS REPORT BY JEFF KING

Brothers and Sisters, In September I had the privilege of attending the Retiree Picnic. It was great seeing folks I had the pleasure of working alongside for so many years. I enjoyed reminiscing with you and look forward to seeing you again soon.

We are making progress on the Local Agreement Negotiations. The Membership submitted over 400 demands, and we have been negoti-

ating these daily. It has been a slow process, for

sure, but we have been making progress. I would like to add that, of the 52 General Motors facilities in the United States, only 5 have settled Local Agreements.

Every year I write a chairman's report and an article for the Union Progress cautioning the Membership that management is always trying to cut jobs. They call this "efficiency gains" but it's management trying to do more work with less people. Job cuts.

Every year I say the same things: Work to your takt time. Follow the JES and TIS. Don't take short cuts. I say these things because, while the Shop Committee has been successful in fighting off many of these job cuts, we need your help. We can't stop management from cutting jobs if people are taking extra breaks. In some cases, members are showing management how to eliminate a job.

If you have an engineer out "observing" your job, please follow the JES to the letter. When you don't, it only helps them figure out how to cut the job.

The final topic I want to talk about is social media. There's a couple of different reasons so I'll get right into it. Be careful what you post, even on your own personal page. Management has a Social Media policy, and they have disciplined people for what they post if it has anything to do with General Motors, as a whole, or this plant, specifically. I am a big believer in freedom of speech but, unfortunately, that freedom does not supersede General Motors "conditions of employment" so please be mindful of that because management seems to have no shortage of time to be able to watch Facebook.

Facebook can be a great tool. When there are updates from the International Union or the corporation, I try to share those on the Members of UAW Local 14/GM TPS page quickly. The local standing committees use Facebook to promote events that they are organizing for the benefit of the membership. Like I said, it can be a great tool. Facebook is a great way to get an answer to a question you may have, as well. However, it

shouldn't be used to place a committee call.

There is a process to place a committee call outlined in the National Agreement. Paraphrasing Paragraph 28, the members must take their issue up with their group leader. Paragraph 29, if the group leader can't fix the issue, then the member has the right to ask for the committee person from their district.

The Committee is very good about answering committee calls in a timely manner but there have been a lot of backlashes lately where people are saying their representative didn't come out to see them only to find out that the group leader never placed the committee call. If your Rep. hasn't been out to see you, instead of taking to Facebook, I encourage the members to call the Work Center and ask if their Rep. has received the call. This lets us know that the group leader is not following the National Agreement. There's a process when this happens, and we will be happy to follow it.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY REPORT BY SUE RODGERS

The RBC Bank account balance on 9/30/2024, was \$2,890,770.80. The book value on 9/30/2024 was \$2,647,969.88, the actual value was \$242,800.92 higher than we can report in the Financial Statement. This is our unrealized gain, and if we cashed in our investments on 9/30/24, our payout would have been \$2,890,770.80.

Residents within the City of Toledo should be receiving notice of a change in property value. Local 14 UAW did, and they are proposing an increase in property value of \$217,100.00. You do have an option to request a property value review, please do this! It's understandable that property values have increased, but to increase this all-inone year is not the way to recoup tax dollars. In my opinion, they are going to drive businesses out of this city. Some of these increases are due to all the vacant buildings, more people working from home and pandemic money has come to a halt. Please call the Lucas County Auditor's office at 419-213-4406, and schedule a review of your property value.

The Local 14 Trustees performed the second quarter of 2024 audit, and no errors or omissions were found. Head Trustee Russ Pinkard reported to the membership that all deposits, checks, bank accounts and all other financial obligations were reviewed, finding all books and records in excellent condition. You will find a copy of this audit in the current Union Progress Paper.

The Halloween Trunk or Treat event will take place on Sunday, October 27, 2024, at the Oscar Bunch UAW GM Park. (Rain location: Local 14 Union Hall) There will be an inflatable obstacle course, pumpkins, hot dogs, snacks and lots of candy. LOCAL 14 UAW EDUCATION **COMMITTEE** BY JIM McGILL


Greetings Local 14 UAW Members!

I hope everyone had a great summer. To me, it seemed to fly by, and a lot has happened already to begin fall, as far as education goes.


• We recently held the second annual Oscar Bunch Golf outing fundraiser, which

There are a lot of resources for veterans but sometimes they don't know how to access this help. The Veteran's Administration is a great place to get PTSD checked, so if you know a veteran that is struggling, please encourage them to go here.

Micki's first vehicle he had in the show was a 1965 Nova. This year he proudly had his 1990 K5 Blazer which is the last year of that model. He really likes the variety of vehicles that enter the show each year. He said anything on wheels is welcome. From cars to motorcycles, people like to see what is made. Micki said in the 80's it seemed everyone had a hotrod. Nice weather also was the norm for the show, for some reason the weekend after Labor Day was the right date for great weather.

At the height of the event there was an estimated 2,000 vehicles that entered. GM dealerships took advantage of the opportunity and displayed new vehicles. The Center for Human Resources sent their UAW-GM semi-trailer that had NA-SCAR remote control vehicles. Live music entertained the crowd. There were also giveaways like a crate motor and cash raffles that kept the attendees engaged.






