FINANCIAL SECRETARY REPORT

Greetings Members of Local 14 UAW, As of October 31, 2025, our RBC Bank account balance was \$2,950,887.37. Our book value on the same date was \$2,612,785.86. It's good to note that the actual value of our investments was \$338,101.51 higher than that reflected in our Financial Statement. This represents our unrealized gain, meaning if we were to liquidate our investments on October 31, 2025, our total payout would have been \$2,950,887.37

The Local Union Officers Conference at Black Lake facility was held this month. We engaged in training sessions and brought back crucial information. Although payment methods like PayPal and Venmo have become common, the International Union has not authorized

their use for union transactions. To maintain transparency, we must continue our current practice that all shirts, hats, or any other sales conducted by the Local Union must be purchased in person at the Local Union Hall. To ensure proper accounting, we must continue to provide a written receipt for every transaction.

They discussed how effective communication remains the top priority for strong union leadership. While many Locals are not doing so, Local 14 stands out as one of the few that offers mass text messaging and still publishes a physical newspaper, podcasts, and we have a Facebook page. This blend of traditional and contemporary methods allows us to reach our diverse membership.

We talked about understanding and adhering to the union's foundational documents, these are essential. Bylaw Function, the process by which a Local Bylaw is enacted or changed was discussed as a fundamental aspect of union governance. Dues Allocation, for those who don't know, the International Union receives 65% of all dues dollars, including retirees dues, to fund its operations. Expenditure approval to spend the

memberships money, no expenditure can be approved at a union meeting unless it was previously posted on the meeting agenda. This ensures all members have an opportunity to review and vote on the item.

Preparations are beginning for the next Constitutional Convention in the summer of 2026, which will include the election of Convention Delegates. The

Brothers and Sisters,

As many of you have heard, our plant is exiting the Electric Vehicle initiative at this time. This was through no fault of anyone at our plant. Our Drive Unit Launch Team worked diligently to make this a successful launch but, unfortunately, the market for electric vehicles just isn't what we were hoping.

It is important to note that we do not anticipate any layoffs as a result of this announcement. The Drive Unit product was never fully staffed and we secured capacity increases in both our AB1V 10 Speed and GF8 Front Wheel Drive transmissions that helped offset any potential loss of jobs. The Shop Committee and I will work to bring more product to Toledo to fill that space in our plant.

Lamar Rucker, Vice President for General Motors Global Propulsion and Battery, held a Face to Face with other Vice Presidents and Plant Managers from around the country at our facility. He described it as a very successful event. The visitors toured the plant and were very impressed with the work we do and our union members that they encountered. Lamar said it was a good day for the Toledo Plant.

Members of the Shop Committee and I attended the UAW Skilled Trades Sub Council in Detroit in October. It was very informative but the most impactful moment was when they discussed safety and the four members at other facilities that lost their lives in work related injuries this past year.

Each of these deaths were completely preventable. In each case, management allowed members to operate in an unsafe manner for the sake of production. This is unacceptable. I can't stress this enough: If you don't feel safe inform management. Involve your Committee. Involve the UAW Safety Representative. Follow all of General Motors Safety Policies.

I want to take this opportunity to wish everyone safe and Happy Holidays. I hope everyone enjoys their time with family and friends.

importance of accurate membership data was heavily emphasized for the upcoming election cycle. The International Union must improve its membership record keeping before the next election in the Summer of 2026. According to the Monitor, failure to do so could result in the election results not being certified, requiring the election to be reconducted or another method to be used.

Recent International Union election participation highlights the need for member engagement. In Oct 2022, using the International Union data, over one million ballots were mailed to UAW Members, and only 106,790 were returned. In Jan 2023 the International Union runoff election, again mailed over one million ballots and 141,548 were returned.

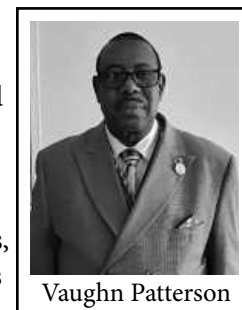

These classes were specifically designed to transform local union representatives into more effective and skilled grievance handlers. It recognizes that the fight for workers' rights doesn't end when a contract is signed; it continues every day on the shop floor, where the contract must be enforced. Some of the things that were covered in the classes were:

- **Grievance Investigation:** Learning effective interviewing and notetaking skills to build a solid case.

Tony Kinard is the focus of this member spotlight. Tony Kinard is the Emergency Response Team (ERT) Chief in our facility. I enjoyed catching up with my friend for this spotlight interview. I've worked alongside Tony for many years on the 8-Speed Mainline, and it's clear he brings the same dedication to his union role as he does to his vital work leading our plant's safety efforts.

Tony commands, by all accounts, the best ERT in General Motors! It's a legacy of service in this facility; Tony notes that there have been three generations of Kinard's working here.

His journey with the ERT started back in 2002 when Duane Severn recruited him. Duane apparently noticed Tony was "always on his phone" and figured he had something for him to do—that something led Tony all the way to the Chief position. Tony takes this role incredibly serious because he understands the gravity of the situation: his work can save the lives of his co-workers.

The ERT is the plant's first line of defense. They are trained to respond to any emergency on the floor within an astonishing four-minute response time. As Tony points out, those four minutes can genuinely be the difference between life and death. Knowing the ERT is ready, whether for a medical incident or another crisis, gives everyone better peace of mind. Tony deeply appreciates the support he receives from his team members and supervisors when he needs time off for urgent medical calls or essential training. Everyone understands the importance of the ERT role and how beneficial their preparedness is to the entire workforce.

Speaking of training, members should know that training hours have just doubled! Thanks to our latest agreement, monthly training has increased from two hours to four hours. Tony gives huge credit to Jeff King and the Shop Committee for securing this crucial win.

This enhanced training covers critical areas like CPR, Confined Space and Rescue, Fall Hazard, and Hazardous Materials. This is vital because the facility is constantly evolving. New technologies, related to EV work requiring specialized handling for rare earth magnets, demand specialized equipment and training. Even departments like the oily waste area require unique instruction. As Tony puts it, "You never know when or where an emergency may happen, but we are prepared for any scenario."



Beyond the plant floor, Tony coaches' basketball, and he drew some insightful parallels between coaching a sports team and leading the ERT. Team building and communication are important in both environments. While the ERT's on each of the three shifts each have a slightly different dynamic, the core similarity remains: they all genuinely care about each other and their co-workers.

Thank you, Tony, for sharing your passion with us, and a massive thank you to every single member of the Emergency Response Team for your tireless and life-saving service to all of us at the facility!

The Emergency Response Team plays a critical role to our members, providing essential support during emergencies and ensuring a rapid and organized response to unforeseen events. Individuals like James VanBuren are the backbone of this service, offering invaluable skills and unwavering commitment when they are needed most. Local 14 extends its sincere



thanks to Jim for his dedicated service and wishes him all the best as he embarks on his retirement and new chapter.

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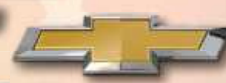
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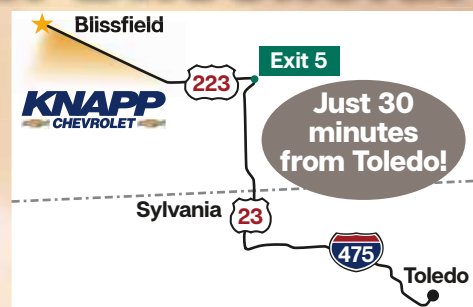


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
