Outdoor Grilling BBQ Safety Tips

It happens every year. The weather gets warmer, more people use outdoor grills – and incidents of grill-caused fires go up. Each year, outdoor grilling causes an average of 8,900 home fires, according to the National Fire Protection Association.

Gas grills cause more home fires than charcoal grills, the association adds.

According to the Hearth, Patio & Barbecue Association, 61 percent of households own a gas grill, 41 percent own a charcoal grill and 10 percent own an electric grill.

Regardless of the type of grill you own, here are 8 BBQ safety tips that will keep you and your home safe for barbecuing season:

1. Grill outside and away from any structures

Charcoal and gas grills are designed for outdoor use only. However, most fires are caused by grills that are too close to the home or another structure. Pay attention to overhanging tree branches when you set up your grill.

2. Make sure your grill is stable

Only set up your grill on a flat surface and make sure the grill can't be tipped over. Consider using a grill pad or splatter mat underneath your grill to protect your deck or patio.

3. Keep your grill clean

Remove grease or fat buildup from both the grill and the tray below the grill. If you are using a charcoal grill, allow the coals to completely cool off before disposing of them in a metal container.

4. Check for propane leaks on your gas grill

Before the season's first barbecue, check the gas tank hose for leaks by applying a light soap and water solution to the hose and then turning on the gas. If there is a propane leak, the solution will bubble.

5. If the flame goes out, wait to re-light

If you are using a gas grill and the flame goes out, turn the grill and the gas off, then wait at least five minutes to re-light it.

6. Take care around the grill

Never leave a lit grill unattended. Don't allow kids or pets to play near the grill. Never try to move a lit or hot grill, and remember the grill will stay hot for at least an hour after use.

7. Be careful with charcoal starter fluid

If you use a charcoal grill, only use charcoal starter fluid. If the fire starts to go out, don't add any starter fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.

8. Be ready to put out the fire

Have baking soda on hand to control a grease fire and a fire extinguisher nearby for other fires. If you don't have a fire

extinguisher, keep a bucket of sand next to the grill. Never use water to put out grease fire.

These easy-to-follow tips will help you and your family to enjoy a safe summer barbecuing season.


Green Stem Events

With Local Schools

Each May GM Toledo holds GREEN STEM events for local elementary schools in our GM/UAW Family Park. The events are meant to increase environmental awareness and to encourage students to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering and math. On May 8, we hosted forty 6th grade students from Larchmont Elementary, on May 21, we hosted seventy 6th graders from Jackman Elementary, and on May 24, we will host eighty five 5th graders from Greenwood Elementary. The students rotate through eight stations where GM Toledo volunteers present the GREEN STEM topic.

Four of the eight stations demonstrate how to check water quality by using samples from Silver Creek, which runs through the GM/UAW Family Park. The students learn how phosphates and nitrates enter water bodies and how to use a test kit to test for their levels. High levels of both indicate poor water quality. Another station explains how low levels of dissolved oxygen in the water will result in events like fish kills. The fourth water quality station is very popular with the students because they see the macroinvertebrates, like crayfish and mayfly larvae, that live in Silver Creek. The higher the number and diversity of macroinvertebrates found means the higher the water quality.

The kids are treated to hot dogs and ice cream and then enjoy some fun time in the park before returning to school.
