## UAW LOCAL 14 FINANCIAL SECRETARY REPORT September, 2020

The Merrill Lynch Account balance on 8/31/2020 was \$3,087,171.87. The book value on 8/31/2020 was \$2,820,991.17 and the actual value was \$266,180.70 higher than we can report on the Financial Statement. This is our unrealized gain, and if we cashed in our investments at the end of August our payout would be \$3,087,171.87.

Congratulations to Tony Totty our newly elected President of Local 14 UAW. Tony has a lot of energy and passion for the UAW. We are a good team for the membership, and I look forward to working with him for the next three years.

We have some work to do in filling the Local 14 vacant Officer positions. Nominations and Elections for the vacant positions will take place at the Amalgamated Meeting on October 25, 2020. The vacant positions include, Recording Secretary, Recreation Director, Education Director, and one Trustee. You must be present at the Amalgamated Meeting to be nominated and elected for one of these positions.

The three Trustees performed the six month audit covering January through June, 2020, and found no discrepancies with Local 14 records. The Trustees performed a thorough exam of Local 14 receipt books, bank statements, Merrill Lynch Statements, payables, Per Capita Taxes, payroll taxes and much more per the International Guidelines. Thank you to our Trustees, Maria Braman, Ryan Baughey, and Ron Kossow, (retiree) for all of the hard work you put in the past three years.

I would like to thank Lori Schultz for all of her hard work and dedication to Local 14 UAW. Lori will be moving on to help others in need, but agreed to act as the Local Recording Secretary until the Local Elections in October. Lori started as the Local Education Director in 1999 and was re-elected in 2002. She was the PT Unit Recording Secretary in 2009 and served on the Women's Committee. Lori was elected Skilled Trades Advisory in 2015 and 2018. She was elected Local 14 Recording Secretary in 2011 through 2020. In between her elected positions, she has always been actively involved in all of the Local 14 functions, Committees and always volunteered numerous hours to help where needed, thank you again.

Brothers and Sisters of Local 14,

I hope everyone and their families had a safe and fun summer. Please continue to follow CDC guidelines for social distancing throughout this global pandemic. I have been praying for the members and their family's safety as we weather these interesting times.

As we approach November 3rd, I encourage all of our members to get out and vote. We are off work November 3rd and 11th for Veteran's Day. I want to personally thank every veteran for their service to this country. Please join me and thank those that served our great country.

I want to remind everyone that vacation time does not carry over into 2021. Paragraph 186 of the UAW/GM National Agreement states that you are able to use the previous year's vacation time in the first week of the year provided December 31 falls in that week.

On September 14, 2020, each member will be receiving a three percent raise. In the case of our In-progression Employees, they will be receiving this raise even if they have not worked 52 consecutive weeks. We will be off on January 1st for the New Year Holiday.

Management is not your friend.

One of management's jobs is to figure out how to do more with less. Group Leaders have become very clever about how to get this done. They ask you questions about your family, how your weekend went, what did you think about the big game? They talk to you like they are just one of the team, but then, on a day where they are short-handed, they ask if you can do a little bit more, just to help them out. Because we are friends, right?

Management is always looking to reduce manpower. With the 2019 UAW/GM National Agreement, over 170 of our members elected to take the Special Attrition Package that was offered. Since that time even more have decided to retire and Management has done very little to replace them. Sure, they brought some people in from the National Employee Placement Center. They even brought in Temporary Employees. But not even close to the amount that have left.

Yes, we are short-handed.

One of the ways they are trying to make up ground is to eliminate jobs. There are engineers out studying departments to see if there are any jobs they can eliminate. Recently, whole departments were reduced because management said they could make the same number of parts without those members only to turn around and man those same departments with overtime. The Shop Committee and I have spent a large amount of time trying to fight these manpower reductions. We have argued every detail of the new Task Instruction Sheets and questioned every second that management says it will take for a member to do the jobs. The only way for management to truly understand what we are saying is if the newly described instructions fail. I encourage all members to follow your JES and TIS. Do your takt time. Please remember that these jobs were set up with ergonomics and safety in mind and that you risk injury when you go outside of these guidelines. When our membership follows the process that Management sets for the jobs and Management cannot figure out how to eliminate, they resort to "can you do me a favor". When we do those "favors" that is how they learn what they can eliminate. Like I said: Clever. Right?

As the industry continues to do more with less, please remember we are in this together. We are strongest when we stand united.

We have many talented and interesting members in our local. As president I not only want to learn more about them, I think our members should know



them also. In the Union Progress I want to start highlighting these members and their passions. The first members that will be covered is Bo Northrop, Mitch and Carmen Seaton. Bo the BBQ Pit Master Bo Northrop is a new retiree

as of April first. I had an opportunity to discover Bo's Barbecue skills when I worked with him in the six-speed front wheel drive. I fell in love with his homemade barbecue sauce and pulled pork sandwiches that he often made for holiday and retirement parties. Bo told me about his love for barbecue and that he started to enter competitions. This started when he was watching competitions on television and saw they received money and trophies for it. He was hooked! Bo entered two competitions in 2014 and has not looked back. The first competition was held in Cincinnati, Bo finished second and realized he can compete with the best in the country. On the day I joined Bo for his competition there were 43 teams in the field which included former National Champions. This was the team's first competition this year and they plan to do around ten. Bo hoped to repeat one of his past successes when he received a perfect score in ribs with



180 points. One of the reasons he enjoys this competition is it gets his adrenaline going. This is also true for Brenda (his wife) who is a team member who helps with the presentation of the meat and tastes the final product to make sure its seasoned correctly. Pat is also on the team, he is the runner who makes sure the timeline is followed, prepares the pork, and makes sure the



final product is delivered on time to the judges. I was impressed with this whole competition and their performance; I was not aware of the different rules and intricacies that governs it. Bo has his cooks down to a science. His color-coded boards let his team know exactly when to perform each task. It reminded me of our Global Manufacturing System. I asked Bo what his best competition would look like and he said it's when he hits all his marks. This is for the prep to the timing of the cook and the presentation. There are variables in taste because of the different animals and their size but his process is the same. This year Bo is preparing the meat with extra sauce and a little extra heat. He must make sure that there is flavor in every bite seeing how the judge's normally only take one bite of the portion. Bo said it does not matter what the judges say if he knows he performed well. It would be hard for me to be a judge because I would take more than one bite of Bo's Bo-B-Q! There are no major competitions in our area. It might be a nice event to hold in our park, stay tuned...Mitch and Carmen the Beekeepers

I had an opportunity to spend some time with Mitch and Carmen Seaton. Mitch works in Ten Speed Case Sub with me and Carmen is a Toolmaker on third shift. They both recently transferred from Detroit Hamtramck and enjoy it here at Local 14.



The reason why they were highlighted is that in their spare time they are Beekeepers. Mitch said they have been doing it for about 12 years. It started when a friend of his was called to collect a swarm of bees and he told Mitch he had to cancel a planned activity. Mitch said



he would go along to watch, that is when he learned about bees. Mitch has many hives on his property, and it is a process to extract the honey from the hives. I am happy to report that no one was stung during today's field trip. Mitch does not get stung often but said if he did it is most likely due to a mistake he made. We prepared smoke to distract the bees so he could take out the honeycomb. I have never seen this done before, so I was intrigued! Mitch told me about all the health benefits of honey. He also told me about the recent decline in the bee population due to pesticides. Unfortunately, his hives have been affected also. He is adding different bees to his hives that are more immune to the pesticides. These are Russian and Carniolan Bees. They also had horses on the property that he trained. I really enjoyed what I learned, thank you Mitch and Carmen for sharing your passion with our membership!

## Brothers and Sisters

Hello to all! I hope that this publication finds all of you doing well during these trying COVID trying times. Moreover, stay safe by following the guidelines of our health experts and leaders. It gives me great pleasure to know that we have a great and expanding family as more and more see the reason why they should form their own union. While we have benefited from those brothers and sisters before us by walking into a UAW established workplace others are not so lucky. For that reason, it is important that we support those who support us. We saw clear evidence of this past September, as some of our biggest supporters in the area were other unions as well as our government elected leaders. Walter Reuther himself said, “the bread box is connected to the ballot box,” making this one of the UAWs four core values. This means that we want to support and vote for those who support us – the working class of America.

In August, the Region 2B Education Department, thought on its feet to maneuver around the COVID pandemic as the department was forced to cancel training that would have otherwise been held at Black Lake. They used technology at hand and held a Virtual Leadership Institute via Microsoft Teams that was moderat-

ed by our regional education director, Amy Richardson. This was a five-day virtual training where I was able to attend the final day. This day was dedicated to our CAP, Community Action Program, which works to protect and improve the economic and social welfare of UAW members and their families through legislative and political action. Amy moderated the discussion for our Indiana and Ohio CAP Directors. Assistant Regional Director, Wayne Blanchard, kicked off the institute by letting us know how important the program is in helping us to maintain our way of life and making sure that we have a voice in our government. Raye Ohl, our regional CAP for Ohio spoke to us about what the program was all about, the amount of money we raise here in Ohio as well as the overall program importance in Ohio. Let me take this time to thank the membership for allowing me the opportunity to attend this portion of the educational program and spread the knowledge from this training.

This was the first virtual training that the region has ever held and what will more than not be a “new normal” for us going forward. The training was very specific to our region as we are one of the largest and most dense regions within the UAW. Toledo is the densest of the cities that the UAW finds its members. This is something we should be proud of remembering back to when we held our picket signs listening to all of the horns going in support of us. The pride was not as clear in other cities. In many meetings we hear about how unions are coming back as people tire of the workplace usuary and not having the benefit of collective bargaining. The fact that we are not seeing more unions coming about stems from one form

of legislation - right to work.

Both Raye and Danny Ernstes, Region 2B Indiana Cap Director, were some of the most energized people when it came to talking politics and the importance that we, the working class play in getting people elected. Raye highlighted the 5 major parts of CAP – fund-raising, member-to-member communication, voter registration/issue education, Get-Out-The-Vote, and finally Lobbying – hold our government elected officials accountable to what they are voting on. Within the region we have 3 main targets to pay attention to this election year; Presidential, Ohio Supreme Court, and ballot races for our state legislature and congress. The thing to hold to the forefront of the mind is that the president is the person who places people at the highest court which can make swing decisions for or against labor. One such instance is when we saw the loss of union power when the Supreme Court ruled in favor of Janus v AFSCME. The decision overall was a strike against the working class that has organized workplaces. The president is the person who has the power to appoint a judge to sit on the Supreme Court – a lifetime appointment – to rule in favor or against labor. After this election we will be looking for a new appointment to the Supreme Court.

Another point that stuck with me had to do with the opportunities that we had to help ourselves in the labor movement. One of our biggest opportunities is to phone bank. This is where we reach out to members and households to see first if they are registered and give the household the process to register if they are not. In Ohio alone we have over 450,000 call to make to ask such questions. Again, thinking ahead our leaders have also thought of how to make sure that people are safe with social distancing and making sure that the calls are made. This can be done by virtual call bank or calling from home. While we will also have the traditional physical phone bank, we will also have a call from home system that people can volunteer to make the calls from home to reach our members.

The reason as to why these calls are so important is due to what our CAP representatives have done through research – more people are registering to vote. In Ohio and Indiana, we have realized a growth of 13.11% between the turn out and registered voters from 2014 and 2018. In Region 2B, we have a total of 60,079 members who are registered, and we saw an increase in our membership voting to the tune of 19.48%. This just goes to show that we believe in that core value - the bread box is connected to the ballot box.

The other thing that was put center stage was the fact that Ohio ranked worst among the nations for gerrymandering. This is a practice intended to establish an unfair political advantage for a party or group by manipulating district boundaries, which is most commonly used in first-past-the-post electoral systems. This is something that is desired by political parties not by the people and most prevalent with the GOP. To this a piece of information came to mind that was passed on from another conference – that was how to see where candidates are getting their funding from. I invite anyone interested in finding out more about their candidates to research them by looking at [www.opensecrets.org](http://www.opensecrets.org). Where a candidate gets their money will show pretty closely as to how they will vote for any legislation that passed their way.

The last piece of information to pass along are the dates for everyone, Michigan and Ohio.

It is my hope as well that everyone was able to read the letter to the editor this labor day that was written to give light to one such constituency group – Pride at Work – as well as CAP and how those not in a union might organize their own union.

This is typically where bipartisanship breaks down. It’s easy to agree that crumbling bridges need to be fixed, but hard to fund those projects in a way that appeals to Republicans and Democrats alike.

Another complicating factor, most candidates who mention wanting to boost investment in infrastructure tend to take a “kitchen sink” approach, throwing in virtually any kind of material asset the federal government is involved with, including airports, veterans’ hospitals, public buildings, broadband and more.

Virtually every candidate who has a position on transportation policy believes our roads are congested (and full of potholes), our airports are crammed and our bridges-built decades ago need expensive replacements. Candidates are happy to tell you how they’ll spend the money on broadening highways, on boosting transit, on high speed rail few have realistic proposals on how to pay for all those new goodies.

Every day, more and more electric vehicles hit the road in the United States. In a country built to serve the automobile and a world confronting a climate crisis, the zero-emissions vehicles seem to be the inevitable future of transportation. Automakers are all in on electric vehicles, but US infrastructure is unprepared. It’s not the cars, it’s how and where we’re going to charge them all.

Of course, the challenges of switching over are many and varied, from automakers trying to figure out how to design cars that look and perform the same but are powered completely differently, to educating people about new technologies (like the difference between a gallon of gas and a kilowatt-hour), to emotionally uncoupling drivers from the sound of an internal combustion engine. The biggest problem rearing its head is something we are all familiar with on a much smaller scale, charging them.

Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure is a station for charging



electric vehicles. With the popularization of electric vehicles, electric vehicle charging stations are bound to become the focus of the automotive industry and energy industry development. Electric vehicle charging stations can



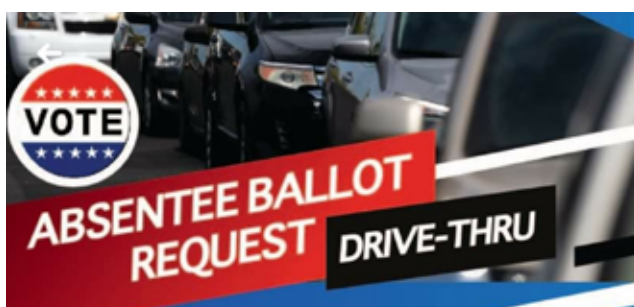
better solve the problem of rapid charging, energy saving and emission reduction.

General Motors Co. is working with electric-vehicle charging operator EVgo to build a nationwide fast-charging infrastructure as the automaker prepares a major push into battery-powered models. The two companies will jointly invest in 2,750 fast chargers in cities and suburbs across the U.S. as GM moves to solve a chicken-and-egg problem that comes with selling EVs: A sparse network of chargers has turned off some potential buyers, but utilities and charging companies have been loath to expand the infrastructure until more plug-ins are on the road. We know how important the charging ecosystem is for drivers, one that includes access to convenient and reliable public fast charging,” Mary Barra, GM’s chief executive officer, said in a statement. “Our relationship with EVgo will bolster the public fast-charging network available to EV customers ahead of increased market demand.”

GM has three new electric models coming out in the



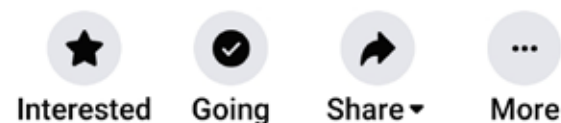

next two years, starting with the Cadillac Lyriq cross-over SUV, which will be shown to the public next week. In 2021, GM plans to sell the Chevrolet Bolt EUV, which is a larger version of the existing Bolt compact, and a GMC Hummer pickup.

The automaker plans to spend \$20 billion developing electric and autonomous vehicles over the next five years and has said it will have at least 20 EVs for sale globally by 2023. EVgo Services LLC’s fast chargers can fully charge an electric-vehicle battery in about 30 minutes, according to the company’s website. That would allow drivers to charge their cars at least partially in the amount of time they might spend running an errand while parked.

Increasing demand for electric vehicles (EVs) is a major factor contributing to the positive growth. This growth is further fueled by the increasing focus of government agencies on providing funding to original equipment manufacturers (OEMs) to develop charging stations. Manufacturers are researching and developing new technologies such as lithium-ion batteries, automatic park and charge, ultra-fast DC charging networks, and wireless charging to increase EV adoption. Lower operating costs, reduced maintenance, and growing awareness among consumers about environmental benefits are further attracting consumers towards EVs. This, in turn, is driving the demand for EV charging stations.

To say there’s lots of political posturing and wrangling around electric cars, plug-in vehicles, and the industry and infrastructure that support them would be an understatement. There are valid debates to be had over whether the Federal Government should subsidize developing technologies that show promise in addressing big societal problems.

Here is some helpful information when purchasing items such as t-shirts, books, or cars. A union label is a small mark displayed on items identifying the product was produced by dues-paying members of a labor union. Sometimes the union label is called a “bug” because of its small, appearance.



The Union label grew in popularity in the printing industry as it expanded and became more organized. A union bug is printed on the label or below the artwork to show the products were made or printed by union laborers. A non-union shop cannot print any union label. This allows customers to know if the products are union-made or not.

Our union label committee is hard at work locating items that are union made in the USA. We order from Union printers, who use union vendors. We also look for made in the USA products as well. This assures us that the company employs workers in our communities. Our communities thrive when workers are financially able to take care of their families.

Also look for the Union Quality stickers and check the vin number on your next car purchase. The first number of the vin number tells you where the car was made 1,4,5 give it a drive. It was made in the USA Check out UAW.org union made for more information on reading the vin number.

## What is Women's Equality Day?

It's one of the most important days you've probably never heard of Women's Equality Day. It commemorates the passage of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which granted women the right to vote. Until then, women had to stay on the sidelines as their fathers, brothers and sons cast their ballots and shaped our democracy. This is the story of our Grandmothers and Great-grandmothers; they lived only 90 years ago. Remember, it was not until 1920 that women were granted the right to go to the polls and vote.

Thankfully, brave suffragists like Susan B. Anthony and Sojourner Truth and so many others fought for change. They organized, petitioned and picketed for decades, and eventually, they succeeded. On August 18, 1920, states ratified the





amendment, guaranteeing and protecting women's constitutional right to vote.

While this was a major victory, and technically allowed all women to cast their ballots, many states still enforced restrictive laws that prevented black women from voting. It wasn't until 1965, with the passage of the Voting Rights act, that voting rights of all women everywhere were protected. Women's Equality Day is a chance to celebrate the achievements of women's rights activists throughout history and to reflect on the challenges women still face today.

Aug. 26, 2020 marks 100 years since ratification of the 19th Amendment that gave women the right to vote. The campaign for women's suffrage began decades before the Civil War, a time during which it was considered that a true woman must be a pious, submissive wife and mother concerned only with home and family. Passed by Congress June 4, 1919, and ratified on August 18, 1920, the 19th amendment guarantees all American women the right to vote. Achieving this milestone required a lengthy and difficult struggle; victory took decades of agitation and protest. Beginning in the mid-19th century, several generations of woman suffrage supporters lectured, wrote, marched, lobbied, and practiced civil disobedience to achieve what many Americans considered a radical change of the Constitution. Few early supporters lived to see final victory in 1920. The campaign



for woman suffrage was long, difficult and sometimes dramatic. Ratification did not ensure full enfranchisement. Decades of struggle to include African American and other minority women in the promise of voting rights remained. Many women remained unable to vote into the 20th century because of discriminatory state voting laws. Beginning in the 1800s women organized, petitioned, and picketed to win the right to vote, but it took them decades to accomplish their purpose. Between 1878 when the amendment was first introduced in Congress, and August 18, 1920, when it was ratified, champions of voting rights for women worked tirelessly, but strategies for achieving their goal varied. Some pursued a strategy of passing suffrage acts in each state, nine Western states adopted woman suffrage legislation by 1912. Others challenged male only voting laws in the courts. Some suffragists used more confrontational tactics such as picketing, silent vigils and hunger strikes. Often supporters met fierce resistance. Opponents heckled, jailed and sometimes physically abused them. By 1916, almost all of the major suffrage organizations were united behind the goal of a constitutional amendment. When



New York adopted woman suffrage in 1917 and President Wilson changed his position to support an amendment in 1918, the political balance began to shift. On May 21, 1919 the House of Representatives passed the amendment and 2 weeks later the Senate followed. When Tennessee became the 36th state to ratify the amendment on August 18, 1920 the amendment passed its final hurdle of obtaining the agreement of three-fourths of the states. Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby certified the ratification on Aug 26, 1920 changing the face American electorate forever.

Women wanted the right to vote because they felt the need to have responsibility and with that they felt as if they had power. Females thought that men and women should both get the right to vote because they wanted equality. It is fair and right that those who must obey the laws should have a voice in making them, and that those who must pay taxes should have a vote as to the size of the tax and the way it shall be spent. Because the moral, educational, and humane legislation desired by women would be got more easily if women had votes. Since 1964, more women than men have turned out to vote for every U.S. presidential election, according to data from the Census Bureau. During the 2018 midterms, 55% of eligible women voters cast ballots, compared to 51% of men. Richards said women "want the right to vote and they want their vote to be protected." Part of Supermajority's mission is to give women resources on how they can vote and where.

When we do vote, we can make change, I think there's no better example than what happened in 2018, where you saw a record number of women and women of color run for office and win. According to the Center for American Progress, the number of eligible women of color voters increased by nearly 59%, or 13.5 million people, from 2000 to 2019. Supermajority re-

leased "What Women Want 2020," a detailed agenda of policy priorities based on their own survey research—including racial injustice and pay equity. Women are desperately concerned about their economic situation, particularly during the pandemic, where a majority of frontline workers are women of color. Women need health care access, equal pay, and "economic security."

"We know that women of color, Black women in particular, are the most progressive, most reliable voters in America, and if in fact if all of us women could come together, provide each other the tools and the support, and frankly, just the community, to do this work together, I think we can have a record turnout of women in November and we can change the direction of the country."

American Red Cross Aids Families Devastated by Hurricane Laura

The American Red Cross is working tirelessly to help people devastated by Hurricane Laura, which struck Louisiana along the Gulf Coast early Thursday morning as one of the most powerful storms the U.S. has ever seen, early reports indicate.

Anticipating a major storm, the National Hurricane Center warned the storm surge from Laura would be “unsurvivable,” prompting evacuation orders of some kind for more than 1.5 million people in Texas and Louisiana. Officials don’t yet know the extent of damage, but the National Hurricane Center predicted Laura would produce “catastrophic damage.”

Laura made landfall as a Category 4 storm near Cameron, Louisiana – close to the Texas border – with 150 mph winds and huge storm surges that were predicted to reach as high as 20 feet. Lake Charles, Louisiana, home to 75,000 people, endured heavy winds that tore up rooftops and shattered windows. Parts of East Texas experienced significant damage, and the city of Orange appeared to be the worst hit in the state, according to Gov. Greg Abbott.

“This storm is everything they said it would be, absolutely catastrophic,” said Red Cross spokesperson MaryJane Mudd.

As the storm moves inland, Laura has continued to inundate communities with flash flooding and prompted hurricane warnings as far as Arkansas. Over 650,000 households lie in the direct and most dangerous part of the storm track.

Right now, Red Cross volunteers and employees are working around the clock to deliver sorely needed relief. As of Thursday, we’d opened several shelters in Texas and one in Mississippi to offer a safe refuge for those forced from their homes. In Louisiana, we are supporting state-run sheltering efforts. With our partners in both Texas and Louisiana, we’re providing nourishing meals and snacks, comfort and care to storm survivors in these shelters.

Our work is only beginning. We know that recovery from a catastrophic storm like this takes time. In the weeks ahead, we will continue to coordinate with community and government partners to assess the damage, address urgent needs and provide support to help survivors rebuild and become more resilient against future crises.

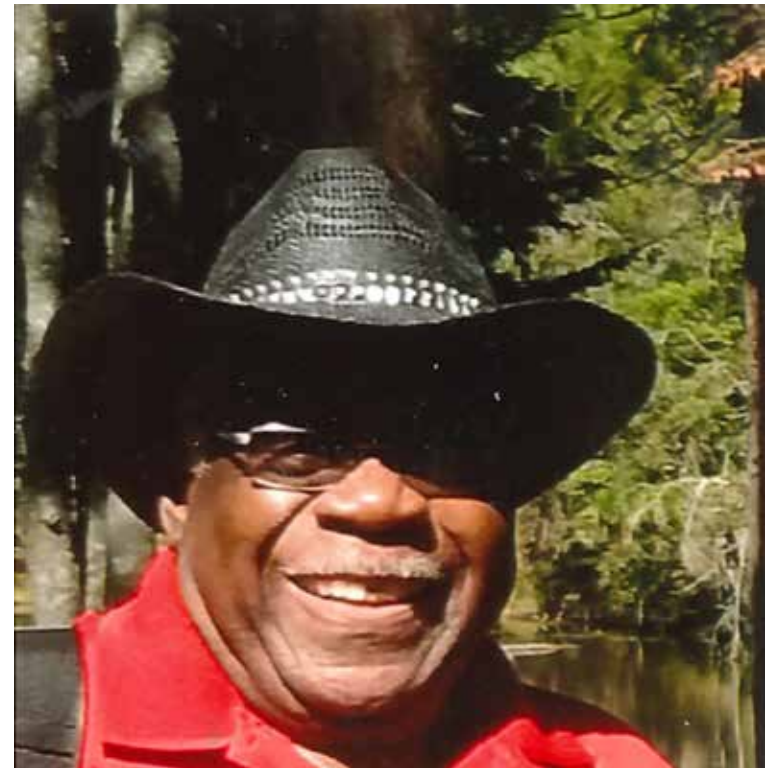
We have to approve expenses for the mailing of the election notice, deposit on The Premier Banquet Hall for the Christmas party next year, and approve the expenses for the election this Septem-
