Local 14 Members Unite for the Workers of Fuyao

Fuyao is a Chinese glass manufacturing company that received 22 million dollars in local and state tax incentives to open a facility in the United States. Fuyao chose to reopen the old GM Moraine Ohio facility to obtain the incentives. Soon after this happened employees started to experience bad treatment in the form of a disregard for their health and safety along with being called lazy American workers. The workers faced this treatment while being paid \$10 an hour. This is when the workers of Fuyao reached out to the UAW for representation. Some of the current workers worked at the same facility when it was a GM plant making trucks. They knew what union representation could accomplish.

Local 14 members went to the first town hall meeting on April 30th to hear from Fuyao workers and local government officials. "Workers shouldn't have to choose between good jobs and safe jobs," said Jessica Martinez, co director of the National Council for Occupational Safety and Health. "Workers are frequently around broken glass and sharp edges without the proper protection, and they have been exposed to the risk of amputation." There were many stories that confirmed Jessica's claims of an unsafe work environment. After this a large rally was set to show that the UAW supports the workers of Fuyao. On Wednesday, October 25th about 40 Local 14 members received unpaid lost time and rode a bus to Moraine Ohio to show solidarity for workers they didn't know but knew they needed help. We joined with other members from all over Region 2B and Michigan. Some estimates had the number just shy of two thousand members showing support. You could see the appreciation of the Fuyao workers while they were coming in and leaving out of work. Our entire membership should be proud of our members, how they conducted themselves, and the sacrifice they made for others!

On November 8 and 9 a union authorization vote took place and we had some members that are making the trip down to

Moraine for the third time.

This experience brought us closer together. It also made us focus in on workers rights outside and more importantly inside our facility.

We need to address the treatment of temporary employees (that are still members) along with in progression members.

This should be addressed in the next national agreement.

If we all put in demands on these issues and connect with other memberships to do the same a more fair existence can be realized.

Be on the lookout for more opportunities to band together for the betterment of workers. Once again, I couldn't be more proud of our membership and what we can accomplish when we are one!

Ed Note: Employees ultimately voted against joining the union, which is now looking into filing unfair labor practice charges against the company's tactics.

Unfortunately, that is what these brave workers faced when all they have asked for is a fair path to helping this manufacturer produce the best products and live up to their commitments it made to the Dayton community."

Happy Holidays Everyone! Thanksgiving is a day to gather with family and give thanks for all the blessings in your life. I am very thankful and blessed to service this membership.

On December 8, 2017 Local 14 will have a Holiday gathering for the membership. We will provide free food, beverages and a DJ "Little John". The event will take place at the union hall and start at 12:00pm-12:00am, this will accommodate all shifts. Please come celebrate the holidays with us!

The Merrill Lynch account balance on 10/31/17 was \$2,951,698,69. The book value was \$2,862,806.56 so the actual value was \$88,892.18 higher than we can report on the financial report. The year to date gain is \$199,432.24.

We are in the process of putting the wall calendars and pocket calendars together for 2018. We received a great price from a local union contractor. that will save around \$3,000

Please take a look at the Local 14 website, its growing with updates and information to benefit the membership. Some of the things you will find are the Union Progress, Local 14 meetings, a calendar with upcoming events, Powerline and other UAW Information, www. uawlocall4.org

The Local 14 Executive Board agreed if a person renting the hall wants to decorate the day before the event we would charge half the cost of our normal rental fee. In the past people were coming in a day before the event to decorate for up to eight hours and sometimes more. This created more expense for us but we did not charge for

In the past we paid our taxes through online banking (ACH Service) but they were charging us \$35.00/month to do this. To avoid this charge we now pay direct to the government agencies, this saves the membership

\$420.00/year.

The liability insurance and truck coverage were up \$251.78 from last year, by paying the full annual premium of \$5,776.18 we saved the membership \$577.23. I did shop this with several carriers but they could not come close to our current price.

We submitted a request to Region 2B Director Rich Rankin to ask of his permission to use the funds in our New Member Orientation Fund. If approved the funds will be used to educate the members of Local 14 about UAW practices. According to the Constitution, Article 16 Section 1. (a). we must seek approval from the Regional Director to expend any funds from this account. I will keep you informed on this and if you would like to see the balance for this account it can be found on the Local 14 Financial Statement.

Our light bill for the month of October was \$1,379.81. As the winter months approach I will keep you informed of the cost for heating this building. I reviewed last year's heating cost and they averaged \$1,200.00/month.

Thank you to all of our veterans for your service and sacrifice to this country. Please take time to thank our veterans on their day November 11, 2017.

I appreciate the Local 14 membership and know this is a privilege to service vou. I work for Local 14 membership so please call me if you need my services.

Happy Veterans Day

I want to take this time to thank the Local for the opportunity to attend the Veterans Advisory Board meeting held in Indianapolis, Indiana. In light of this year's Veterans Day observation, I thought it would be appropriate to share some of the information I received at the conference.

Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on Nov. 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the end of World War I. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 for an annual observance, and Nov. 11 became a national holiday beginning in 1938. Veterans Day is not to be confused with Memorial Day-a common misunderstanding, according to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Memorial Day (the fourth Monday in May) honors American service members who died in service to their country or as a result of injuries incurred during battle, while Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans-living or dead-but especially gives thanks to living veterans who served their country honorably during war or peacetime.

VETERANS DAY FACTS

In 1954, President Eisenhower officially changed the name of the holiday from Armistice Day to Veterans Day.

In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed by Congress, which moved the celebration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. The law went into effect in 1971, but in 1975 President Ford returned Veterans Day to November 11, due to the important historical significance of the date.

Britain, France, Australia and Canada also commemorate the veterans of World Wars I and II on or near November 11th: Canada has Remembrance Day, while Britain has Remembrance Sunday (the second Sunday of November). In Europe, Britain and the Commonwealth countries it is common to observe two minutes of silence at 11 a.m. every November 11.

VETERANS STATS

The brave men and women who serve and protect the U.S. come from all walks of life; they are parents, children and grandparents. They are friends, neighbors and coworkers, and an important part of their communities. Here are some facts about the current veteran population of the United States.

There are approximately 23.2 million military veterans in the United States.

9.2 million Veterans are over the age of 65.

1.9 million Veterans are under the age of 35.

1.8 million Veterans are women.

7.8 million Veterans served during the Vietnam War era (1964-1975), which represents 33% of all living veterans.

5.2 million Veterans served during the Gulf War

(representing service from Aug. 2, 1990, to present).

2.6 million Veterans served during World War II (1941-1945)

2.8 million Veterans served during the Korean War (1950-

6 million veterans served in peacetime.

As of 2008, 2.9 million veterans received compensation for service-connected disabilities.

5 states have more than 1 million veterans in among their population: California (2.1 million), Florida (1.7 million), Texas (1.7 million), New York (1 million) and Pennsylvania (1 million).

The VA health care system had 54 hospitals in 1930, since then it has expanded to include 171 medical centers; more than 350 outpatient, community, and outreach clinics; 126 nursing home care units; and 35 live-in care facilities for injured or disabled vets.

UAW Social Security Department

The UAW Social Security department provides advice and assistance in designing and implementing collectively-bargained benefits, ranging from health, dental, and vision insurance plans, to pensions and 401(k) plans, to life and disability insurance, to supplemental unemployment benefit (SUB) plans and other job and income protections. The department also plays a major role in the UAW's legislative and community action efforts in such areas as health care reform. defending Medicare, Medicaid, and Social Security, and protecting the pensions and savings plans of retired workers. Members of the department represent the UAW on many commissions and boards.

Build here so we can buy

UAW News - The rally call of "Buy American" isn't new, but the proposition looks very different in 2017 than it did in the 1970s. Back then, there were almost 20 million workers in the U.S. making goods in factories across the country (today, it's 12.3 million). These workers made clothes, baseballs, toys, blue jeans, electronics and a host of goods you could find in your neighborhood store.

That's one way the conversation today is different. Asking consumers to "Buy American" makes no sense unless there are things to buy. Instead, in 2017 we have to talk about building it here so we can buy it here.

The last 30 years have taught us a few things about the importance of a strong manufacturing base in the United States. Making products here - from consumer goods to heavy equipment — builds stronger communities through jobs that multiply: Each new full-time job created in manufacturing leads to 3.4 full-time jobs in related non-manufacturing industries

(Source: Manufacturers Alliance for Productivity and Innovation, September 2016). These factories also produce goods that are safer for our families and the workers who make the products. From lead in toys to sweatshop conditions, the real cost of purchasing cheap imported goods is often hidden.

Bringing back manufacturing jobs won't be easy, but the steep price of not taking this on will be paid by generations to come. Much of our fight will rest on changing government policies whether it's product labeling, procurement of goods and services or trade agreements. Far too often, these laws and rules favor the interests of the few who profit over the benefits to the many. Why else would our trade negotiators resist stronger labor and environmental laws abroad? Our country's agenda should be to lift everyone, not make it easier to race to the bottom.

And as we demand that manufacturing jobs be created here, we have to remain mindful that

not all jobs are equal. Our goal should be well-paying and safe jobs that can sustain families.

In the meantime, we shop. In 2016, it's estimated Americans spent over \$5 trillion on retail sales. We look at products for good value, but measuring that value is more than just looking at the sticker price.

Collective bargaining lifts wages not only for the workers covered by the contract, but also those in the area and industry. Some of the most enduring and iconic manufacturers in this country are union and have been for decades: Louisville Slugger, Fiestaware, Jim Beam, Ghirardelli chocolates, Callaway golf balls, General Motors, Ford and FCA USA, to name a few. And union members are generous champions of the communities they live in, often involved or leading a host of service projects.

Standing together, we can build an economy that lifts us all. We can reward good employers with our purchasing power while investing in a future for the next generation.

UAW News – It's hard to believe, but email has been around for 45 years. You read that right. That's a four and a five.

Ray Tomlinson, a contractor who was working on the U.S. Department of Defense's ARPANET (Advanced Research Projects Agency Network) project, is credited with inventing email way back in 1972.

Other things that happened in 1972?

Life Cereal premiered its *Little Mikey* advertising campaign.

Al Green's *Let's Stay Together* and Don McClean's *American Pie* were topping the charts.

A new house would set you back \$27,550, you could pay the rent for \$165 per month, and a gallon of leaded gas was only 55 cents.

Like many things built back then, they just don't make online communications tools like they used to. While we have seen many flashes in the pan through years of social media progress, email has been a mainstay over nearly five decades and remains the most effective means of reaching your audience

To buy American made Union made or American made products is the best way to go. As far as grievance handling, keep the grievance simple. It doesn't have to be all extra-long, but short and straight to the point is best, and fill out the FACT SHEET. Grievances can be lost in later steps due to not having proper notes or the fact sheet. Also, have the person filing the grievance write what happened down and sign it so you have a point of reference, because if it takes months to solve the grievance, you have the story from when it happened, when it was fresh in their mind.

The overall trip was great. I got to meet so many union workers from the Ohio area, from nurses to plastic mold and die people. All are part of the UAW and here I thought it was just automotive workers in the UAW. The teacher for my ethical consumer class was a sheriff. If you ask me, every union person should go to Black Lake at least once if they can.

I end this article with, my family and I will be vacationing there in the near future and I can't wait to show them our UAW HOME.





Why the UAW Endorses Political Candidates

There is a direct relationship between the ballot box and the bread box, and what the union fights for and wins at the bargaining table can be taken away in the legislative halls.

(Walter Reuther)

Recently, in the past few public political cycles there has been a push back against some of the candidates the UAW has endorsed from our members. The UAW understands that members put a lot of consideration into their choices and will always vote their conscience. The endorsements made by the UAW should let the members know that the candidate was screened and was viewed as the best candidate that would uphold the union's objectives.

Common Questions asked about this process

How do we choose the candidates?

The screening committee makes its recommendations based on its evaluation of the candidates voting records and/or positions on trade, education, Medicare, retirement security, right to work laws, worker's compensation, unemployment insurance and other issues that directly affect UAW members and our families.

Does the UAW only endorse Democrats?

No. Endorsements are based on the candidate's record and positions on issues, not only on party.

Over the years, UAW CAP has endorsed pro-working family Independents and Republicans as well as Democrats.

Does our Union Dues go to campaign contributions?

By law, union dues can't be used to support any federal candidate. This is true for many states as well.

What money goes towards political candidates?

Voluntary Community Action Program (V-CAP) is the UAW's political action fund made up of voluntary contributions from UAW members, retirees and their families. The money is used to support pro-worker political candidates who have earned the endorsement of the UAW Community Action Program (UAW CAP).

If you would like to contribute to the VCAP fund let your committee person know, there also should be a VCAP drive coming up in the facility shortly.
