UAW leaders back Cordray for Ohio

Speaking at a Press conference Monday in Toledo, UAW leaders, including Local 14 President Dennis Earl and Local 1435 President Tim Walbolt blasted the record of Republican gubernatorial candidate Mike DeWine and praised the record of UAW-endorsed candidates Richard Cordray and Betty Sutton.

They were joined at the podium by Toledo City Council (at large) member Nick Komives.

Dennis Earl noted the record of DeWine, charging him with voting for NAFTA, promoting "right-to-work in Ohio, fighting raises in the minimum wage, and other actions against workers. "Right-to-work laws never help working people," he said. They only line the pockets of big corporations.

Working Ohioans need straight answers from the next governor. They will get them with Richard Cordray and Betty Sutton," Earl said.

He noted that Cordray stood with auto workers during the economic recession of 2008, and fought against Republican measures which would have finished off the American auto industry.

He also took on banking institutions which caused the recession with sharp business practices. He retrieved billions of dollars for

consumers hurt by these business excesses.

Betty Sutton's "cash for clunkers" program helped jump-start the auto economy during the darkest days of the recession, he noted, and she has always been a leader in the fight for social and economic justice for working families.

"Workers don't need a handout. They need a level playing field. Ohioans should know better than to trust DeWine with their jobs," he said.

The UAW wants members to check the track records of the candidates for Governor and Lt. Governor, as well as all other candidates who are asking for their votes.

If they do, they will find that Richard Cordray and Betty Sutton have always taken middle class workers's concerns seriously and have worked to protect the rights of workers and their families.

Their support has led to investments at GM Powertrain and Jeep in Toledo and to the Toledo Machining Plant in Perrysburg.

Walbolt and Komives echoed Earl's words, noting the "dismal" track record of DeWine on every issue affecting workers, and the real and effective work Richard Cordray and Betty Sutton have done on behalf of working families.

UAW's new officers have history of service

UAW News – Gary Jones was elected UAW president at the union's 37th Constitutional Convention. Jones previously served as the union's Region 5 Director. Jones was first elected to serve as director of UAW Region 5 in a special election held Oct. 19, 2012, in Kansas City, Mo.

A graduate of the University of Tulsa and a certified public accountant, Jones was appointed top administrative assistant to former UAW Secretary-Treasurer Roy Wyse in 1995. He continued to serve in that capacity to Secretary-Treasurers Ruben Burks and Elizabeth Bunn, until his appointment as Region 5 assistant director in 2004.

In 1990, former UAW President Owen Bieber and then-Secretary-Treasurer Bill Casstevens appointed Jones to the International staff. He was assigned to the union's Accounting Department. A year later, Jones was named chief accountant of the UAW.

A UAW Local 1895 member, Jones was hired at Ford Motor Co.'s Glass plant in Broken Arrow, Okla., in 1975. He became a member of UAW Local 249 when he transferred to the Kansas City Ford Assembly Plant when the glass plant closed.

Jones is a lifetime member of the NAACP and various other civic and political organizations. Jones and his wife, Cindy, live in Canton, Michigan. They have two daughters and three granddaughters.

Ray Curry was elected UAW secretary-treasurer at the Convention. Curry was first elected director of UAW Region 8 in June 2014, at the 36th UAW Constitutional Convention in Detroit after having served four years as the region's assistant director.

As Region 8 director, Curry was instrumental in securing new labor agreements with various parts suppliers. In July 2015, under his leadership, the region successfully organized the first gaming bargaining unit of Region 8 as part of a coalition of four other unions to represent the Horseshoe Casino in Baltimore, Maryland. In October 2017 the combined coalition reached its first individual collective bargaining agreements. UAW Local 17 represents the table dealers. Under Curry's leadership, the region also won an election for representation at MGM National Harbor in Oxon Hill, Maryland, in June 2018, bringing 950 new members into the union.

Curry joined the UAW in July 1992 when he hired in as a truck assembler at Freightliner Trucks in Mount Holly, North Carolina.

Cindy Estrada was elected to her third term as a UAW vice president. The longtime union organizer and social activist was

first elected as vice president in 2010 and is the first Latina elected to serve as an International officer.

In 1995 Estrada was assigned to help organize workers at Mexican Industries in southwest Detroit. The organizing campaign resulted in one of the largest UAW victories for Spanish-speaking manufacturing workers. That win, along with other significant UAW organizing successes, led then-UAW President Stephen P. Yokich to appoint Estrada to the International's organizing staff in 2000.

Terry Dittes was elected to serve his first full term as a UAW Vice President at the Convention. Dittes was elected to a partial term as Vice President in January of 2018. He previously served as director of Region 9, having been elected at a special convention held on March 26, 2014 in Buffalo N.Y.

Terry was hired at the Fisher Body Plant in Trenton, New Jersey in 1978 and became a member of UAW Local 731. He then transferred to General Motors Parts in 1980 in Bensalem, Pennsylvania and became a member of amalgamated UAW Local 585. He later became a member of UAW Local 2177 when his plant was granted a charter for that unit in GM Parts. In 1985 he was elected alternate committeeperson of Local 2177.

In 1986 Terry was elected as a full-time committeeperson, and was re-elected to the post in 1989. In 1992, Terry was elected to Chairperson of the Bargaining Committee. After being elected to the Shop, he was appointed to the Region 9 servicing staff in 1999. At a special convention held on March 26, 2014, Terry was elected Director of UAW Region 9.


Rory Gamble was elected a vice president at the convention. Gamble previously served three terms as director of UAW Region 1A. Gamble, a welder fixture repairman, joined the UAW in 1974 when he was hired at the Ford Motor Co. Dearborn (Mich.) Frame Plant. He immediately became active in UAW Local 600 and has since served in numerous elected and appointed positions.

He served as bargaining committee chair in 1984. In 1988 he was appointed staff director and administrative assistant for Local 600's president. As editor of the local's newspaper. He was elected delegate to the UAW's 32nd Constitutional Convention and served on the Constitution Committee.

Since 1987 Gamble's assignments have included local union health and safety coordinator, employee support services program, education director, and civil rights coordinator.

Gamble was elected first vice president of Local 600 in 2002 and re-elected in 2005.

AMERICAN CARS, AMERICAN JOBS ACT OF 2018

Too many incentives still exist for automakers to downsize their U.S. workforces and offshore auto jobs from the U.S. Ohio workers in Youngstown witnessed that firsthand earlier this year when GM announced that it would begin production of the Chevy Blazer in Mexico on the very same day 1,500 workers at the Lordstown, Ohio plant worked their last shift. GM cited insufficient demand for the Cruze, which is made at the

Lordstown plant, as the reason for the layoff. The year before, GM laid off the third shift for the same reason. To create more jobs in the U.S. auto sector, it is critical that we establish a policy structure that puts U.S.-made cars on equal footing with foreign-made vehicles. It is also imperative that the U.S. tax code does not create incentives for auto companies to offshore jobs to Mexico or any other country.

The American Cars, American Jobs Act of 2018 includes two provisions designed to establish parity between American-made and foreign-made vehicles to make it too costly for auto companies to lay off workers in the U.S. and hire workers overseas.

Specifically, the American Cars, American Jobs Act of 2018 would level the playing field for U.S.-made vehicles by establishing a targeted, temporary program that provides consumers with a \$3,500 price deduction on a purchase or 5-year lease of a new, American-made passenger vehicle. A passenger vehicle qualifies for the rebate program if:

1) at least 45 percent of its content is identified as U.S./Canadian under the American Automotive Labeling Act (AALA); and

2) if final assembly of the vehicle is done in the U.S. Nearly 100 vehicles, including all passenger vehicles made in Ohio, qualify for this program based on the 2018 AALA list.

The rebate is provided to consumers at the dealership, and the dealership is subsequently reimbursed by the U.S. Government.

Individuals are eligible for only one \$3,500 rebate, and the dealership must offer the rebate in combination with any other offers available to the consumer. The program expires either at the end of two years or when all funding for the program runs out.

The American Cars, American Jobs Act of 2018 also addresses GM's decision to produce a Mexican-made Blazer by changing an offshoring incentive in the new GOP tax law.

Under the GOP tax law, profits

on foreign-based U.S. company subsidiaries (called Controlled Foreign Corporations) are taxed at 0 percent unless they exceed 10 percent of that subsidiary's value. Profits exceeding 10 percent of the subsidiary's value are taxed under the GOP tax law at 10.5 percent instead of the full corporate tax rate of 21 percent. This corporate carve out creates an incentive for companies to earn more profits overseas.

The American Cars, American Jobs Act will close this loophole by amending Section 250 of the U.S. tax code to deny this lower overseas tax rate to auto companies that meet both of the following criteria:

1) the company's number of full-time U.S. employees is less than the number of full-time U.S. employees employed by that company on the day the tax bill passed; and

2) the same company increased the number of full-time employees working for its Controlled Foreign Corporations in the same taxable year.

If an auto company meets both the criteria in any given tax year it would pay the full 21 percent, instead of the 10.5 percent, on of its foreign-earned income that exceeds 10 percent of a Controlled Foreign Corporation's value.

Through these provisions, the American Cars, American Jobs Act of 2018 would make it easier for U.S. auto workers to compete against foreign auto workers and make it more costly for companies to choose to offshore their production overseas.

Financial Secretary-Treasurer

The Merrill Lynch account balance on 7/31/18 was \$2,884,072.08.

The book value on 6/30/18 was \$2,826,193.09 and the actual value was \$57,878.99 more than we can report on the financial statement. This is our unrealized gain and if we cashed in our account at the end of June our payout would be \$2,884,072.08.

Our light bill for the month of July was \$1,264.47 and the gas bill was \$168.18. On the weekends the thermostats are programmed based on the length of time the renter is in the hall and it will shut down at the end of evening. Last year the summer light bill averaged \$1,600 per month.

On August 2, 2018 the Local 14 Trustees performed the 6 month audit and found no discrepancies. The Trustees for Local 14 are Maria Braman, Jamaal Kirby, and Ryan Baughey. Thanks for your dedication and service to Local 14.

An additional rebate was due from Ohio Bureau of Workers Compensation in the amount of \$118.00 this was received at the end of July.

Local 14 Union hall currently uses Guardian Alarm for the alarms and security camera coverage. The cost for this is \$326.90 every three months. We are currently looking into other options for the building coverage.

As I indicated last month we had six Cedar Point tickets to give away at the Amalgamated Meeting on July 22, 2018. The winners were, Jamele Perry, Tracie Chovan, Tony Totty, Ryan Baughey, Peggy McKnight-Wilson and Christina Horvath. Congratulations everyone!

Our five year contract with Ara-

mark expired 7/31/18 and we did not renew this. This will save Local 14 over \$1,500 per year. Local 14 owns enough rugs for the building until the winter months, at that time we will purchase three rugs.

Just a reminder September 3 is Labor Day and Local 14 members are invited to join us in the downtown Toledo Parade. If you are interested in participating please contact the hall for more details.

The Park and Shine car show is held on September 9 at the Oscar Bunch/GM Powertrain Park This year Local 14 will be collecting donations at the gates to help supplement wages of the two seasonal workers in the park

I will continue to keep you informed on the monthly hall rentals in this building. In the month of July the upstairs hall was rented 10 times and the downstairs was rented 13 times.

Did you know Local 14 members can rent 20'x30' tents at a cost of \$45.00 for three days or a full weekend. Members can also rent ten tables with 40 chairs at a cost of \$25.00 for three days or a full weekend. If you are interested in renting these please call the hall for further details.

You can rent a shelter from Local 14 for your family gathering. The shelters are located next to the GM Powertrain plant in the Oscar Bunch Park Shelters. Shelters 1-4 are \$35.00 and shelter 5 is \$45.00, the rental time is from 9 am to dark

Local 14 halls are open for rent to any member to hold receptions, parties and other family events. We have two halls available, the upstairs has a capacity of 325 people and the downstairs has a capacity of 120 people. A security deposit of \$250 is required to

hold a date and will be refunded if no damages are found and the contract rules are followed. The upstairs hall rate for Friday and Saturday is . \$400 each night and the downstairs hall is \$300 per night. If you prefer a Sunday rental, both halls are \$100.00 each. If you are interested in a specific date please call the union hall for availability during the hours of 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday at 419-473-2854.

UAW News – On a spring Saturday on May 1, 1886, workers at 13,000 businesses across America took a stand against dangerous work and low wages, and for an eight-hour work-day.

An estimated 300,000 to a half million workers, many of them immigrants, rallied and paraded through city centers in a general strike to demand an end to unsafe factory jobs with high death rates and little pay while corporations raked in booming profits.

They also were encouraged by the growing labor movement and populist politics sweeping the nation as immigrants poured into the U.S. looking for a better life and found only backbreaking exploitation in dirty, unsafe factories.

Power brokers took notice of the show of force that day and, while it would take decades for workers to have true rights and safety on the job, that first May Day was a milestone for unity and justice for workers everywhere.

May Day would become an annual tradition that would lead to an International Workers Day holiday celebrated throughout the world today.

There are National Negotiations that will take place next year. Save your money. In my opinion, GM is fat and arrogant.

Rev. Barber fights for 'Other' U.S.

UAW News – At the UAW Constitutional Convention in June, The Rev. Dr. William Barber, the fiery preacher and leader of the Poor People's Campaign, brought delegates to their feet with a message about race, politics, inequality and how America's "rejected" and disadvantaged can turn the tables and take this country back.

Rev. Barber explained that failed bureaucracies that leave communities with poisoned water, states that suppress voting rights and politics that play to issues that divide Americans are detrimental to our democracy and must be stopped.

Racism. Gender discrimination. Militarism. Those are issues the powerful use to divide allies. Those are issues that caused supporters to turn against the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., said Barber. And today those are among the issues that divide allies like labor and religious leaders. Barber was at the Vatican and referenced how the pope addressed why that kind of division must change.

"He told all of us that even if you

are in labor or in religion and you only deal with the next contract, but you don't use your power to deal with racism and poverty, you have not fulfilled your calling by God to transform the world," Barber said.

The disadvantaged and poor make up the other America, Barber added. That is the America with substandard housing, poisoned water and little if any economic justice. But there are more of those "rejected" Americans than there are oppressors and it's time for coalitions committed to the moral high ground to come together.

"The rejected must come together ... what we need in this country is a massive, nonviolent fusion. Civil disobedience. Mobilization. And, we need mass power-building among the poor and the working poor." Barber told delegates.


